2015 SPRING MEET – Attadale

Saturday 16th – Saturday 23rd May 2015

After a glorious spell of weather in April hopes were high for a warm and balmy week at Attadale in May. But this was not to be. The weather turned cold and windy – in fact the coldest and windiest we have experienced so far. But the SAC Attadale group are nothing if not hardy souls. Undaunted, the kayakers kayaked, the walkers walked, the explorers explored and we ate and drank well and put the world to right each evening. Each year the number of kayakers in the group has increased and this year there were 9 with great plans, one of which was to kayak on Loch Coruisk on Skye. Unfortunately the wind thwarted this ambition and plans had to be changed. However excellent days kayaking were experienced including one on Loch Long with Eilean Donan Castle as a backdrop. Frigga Kruse is a graduate of the University of Glasgow and has a PhD from the University of Groningen in The Netherlands. Her book "Frozen Assets: British mining, exploration and geopolitics on Spitsbergen, 1904 – 53" was reviewed in the newsletter a year ago. She is currently a post-doctoral researcher, still at Groningen, on polar historical archaeology. She writes: "We all know that Ponting went south and created the unique photographic record of Scott's expedition. But few people know Ponting also went to Spitsbergen with the Northern Exploration Company in 1918. He certainly took photographs there, recording the mining endeavour. But where are those photos? Perhaps one of your readers may know? There is a real chance that the photos are mixed into the Antarctic collection and no one has noticed."

The Walter Livingstone-Learmonth Kayak in Edinburgh

Walter Livingstone-Learmonth was born in Australia to Scottish parents and educated in Edinburgh. He enlisted on the whaling ship *Eclipse* (Captain David Gray, Peterhead) to the Greenland Sea in 1888 and on the *Maud* (Captain William Adams, Dundee) to Baffin Bay in 1889, for sport! He wrote copious Journals, and took many photographs, which are in the **Natural History Museum**, London, the **Library and Archives Canada**, Ottawa and in museums and archives round the UK. He also collected many Inuit artefacts from Greenland and Baffin Island. He bought a Greenlandic kayak and a full set of hunting gear from a local hunter, Martin Daniel (see photograph), in the village of Noursauk (now Nûgssuaq, north of Disko Island, 70° 40'N, 54° 30'E) for two sovereigns! He gave this to the **National Museum of Scotland**, Edinburgh in 1894 (accession number 1894-227). It is still there and several of us were very fortunate to see this recently (thanks to the Curator, Ross Irving, for permission to visit and photograph) in the National Museums Collection Centre, Granton, along with a fine set of artefacts and clothing. Harvey Golden, who surveyed it in 2002, was very helpful.
